UNO MUST TAKE OVER SWA

MR. ERIC LOUW may feel that he deserves a pat on the back for his prophetic vision over the events at Windhoek, but there is nothing else for which he is to be congratulated. Twelve dead and many more injured cry out in condemnation of his and his government's policies towards the people of South West

EVERY DROP OF BLOOD SPILT AT WINDHOEK IS A STAIN ON THE GOOD NAME OF SOUTH AFRICA WHICH NO AMOUNT OF CURSING AT "AGITATORS," OR BLAMING THE UNITED NATIONS, WILL EVER BE ARLE TO FRASE

The general reason for widespread unrest and public disorders in South West Africa is the same as the reason for similar phenomena in the Union; a despotic form of government which no longer even pretends to take the wishes of the government into consideration; a government which more and more relies on armed force to push obviously unpopular policies down the throats of unwilling people.

There is, however, a further reason for the present unrest in South West Africa, and that is the ever-growing and ever-more clearly expressed demand of the people of that territory for independence from foreign domination. And the foreign domination they want to rid themselves of is that of South Africa.

The habit of thinking of South West Africa as part of the Union, a kind of fifth province, is one that has persisted for many years in all political circles. The developing struggle of the people of that territory is presenting the problem in a new light, and it is time for a fresh assessment of the situation.

South West Africa does not belong to the Union of South Africa; that is the salient fact from which all else flows.

The territory was conquered by force of arms during World War I by South African troops fighting a war for imperialist aims. South Africa continued as the occupying and administering power subject to the peace treaty which followed. That treaty, and the subsequent obligations assumed under the old League of Nations, gave the Union the temporary right to administer South West Africa under certain conditions.

It did not give the Union the right to grab the territory as its own, nor did it give the Union the right to trample on the most elementary human and political rights of the inhabitants.

By denying the people of South West Africa the right to self-determination, by denying them the right to any say in the control of their own destinies, the Union has violated both the legal and the moral obligations it assumed under the peace treaty.

Former German conquerors and colonists, who looted the land and murdered the people, have been eiven the franchise, all the political rights anyone could hope for. The Ovambo, Damara, Nama, Herero and other indigenous African becople, for whose "liberation" South African troops ostensibly fought in the first Great War, are still oppressed, denied all opportunity for political advancement.

■ The only difference for them is the fact that South Africans are now acting the conqueror in place of the Germans.

Turn and twist as they like, the South African imperialists will not be able to escape the consequences of their policy.

The Union has lost the moral, if not the legal, right to continue in occupation of South West Africa.

To remain in occupation of South West Africa against the clearly expressed demand of the people is to commit an act of international aggression.

The people of South West Africa no longer wished to be fied to the Union, to be governed by an alien power.

They want to govern themselves: that is the essence of their demand that the territory be handed over to the United Nations so that it may be administered in a humane and civilised manner.

On October 26 the inhabitants of the Cuban village of Socorra were peacefuly going about their business, when an aeroplane suddenly swooped down upon them from the skies and rained bombs down upon them. Two of the vil-layers were killed and a number wounded. THE AERO-PLANE RETURNED TO ITS BASE IN FLORIDA, U.S.A.

The attack, far from striking terror into the hearts of the people of Cuba as it was supposed to do, aroused the Cubans as never before in defence of their newly-gained independence and freedom. A million people assembled in Havana alone to denounce the U.S. imperialists for allowing the agents of the overthrown Cuban dictator Batista to use bases in America for armed terror attacks against the people of Cuba.

The Americans at first hotly denied that they bore any re-sponsibility for the attacks, but this denial only served to increase the anger of the Cubans. So powerful were the demonstrations that followed that the officials in Washington were compelled to eat their words, and they finally undertook to see to it that the bombing raid would never be repeated.

• Meanwhile the enemies of Cuban freedom continue to reveal new plots for the overthrow of the Castro Govern-ment, but every time they are frustrated by the strength and unity of the Cuban people, who are overwhelming in their support of the new popular regime.

A million Cubans recently gathered in the streets of Havana at a giant rally to protest against the bombing of unsuspecting Cubans by American-based aeroplanes. IKE IN ASIA

THE hearty reception President given to Fisenhower on his recent trip to Europe and Asia stands in marked contrast with the cold welcome which the late John Foster Dulles used to receive when he made similar journeys.

The difference in the nature of the receptions given to the two men is partly attributable to the personal charm which lke possesses and Mr. Dulles lke possess never had.

In these speeches he emphasised that America would continue to provide military aid to these countries and that there was no question of dissolving exist-ing military blocs.

The outlook for disarmament must remain bleak as long as the U.S. continues to allow the most reactionary of its allies to call the tune on the subject.

Perhaps the most impor-tant feature of the tour was that it was felt to be necessary at all. Ike is the first U.S. Pre-sident to visit Asia, and his visit to that continent shows how important it has become in world affairs in recent years.

Barred Books: The Reasons

COMMENTING on the with drawal of books from the British book exhibition now on here, Mr. Alexander Ry-bin, head of the Soviet publishing organisation Glavizdat, said recently:

We were anxious that not a single book should give cause for mis-understanding, disapproval or in-

understanding, disapproval of in-dignation among visitors.

Any suggestion that we are afraid of these books is ludicrous. Cer-tainly the Soviet Union would not collapse if they were exhibited," he said, adding that a large num-ber of foreign books by authors of all shades of opinion are pub-

of all shades of opinion are pub-lished in the Soviet Union.
We were prompted solely by the desire to aid good feelings be-tween our two countries. We want the exhibition to help friendship and mutual understanding. For us friendship with the British people is the most important thing of all."

Will Non-Whites Get Real Chance to Make Olympic Games?

NOTWITHSTANDING the tentative arrangements being made by Non-White amateur sport administrators to send a team of Non-White ortsmen to participate in the Olympic Games next year, it looks as though the promise made by Mr R. Honey, a few months ago that there will be no "discrimination on racial grounds" when it came to the selecting of a team to the Olympic Games, will not come

Present indications are that Non-White sportsmen are going to be robbed of the opportunity of re-presenting their country in the Olympic Games either by consti-Olympic Games either by constitutional technicalities or by apartheid conditions. Non-White amateur national sporting bodies with the most of the sporting bodies before they can have a hope of sending representatives to the Olympic Games. More often than not, the terms of affiliation by Non-White bodies to White bodies are such as to place Non-White sporting bodies in an inferior position — third rate members.
