## Letter from H. Pollitt to A. Marty, 1 November 1937<sup>1</sup>

1.11.1937.

H. C.!2

We regret that a misunderstanding has developed about the work of the South African commission. We assure you that we in no way wish to deviate from past decisions.<sup>3</sup>

We did not seek the responsibility for the leadership of the South African comrades and we believe that this task was given to us by the center. We readily admit that we have no authority to make decisions in this matter. As soon as we found out that you were in Paris we immediately suggested that the comrades contact you as the responsible leader representing the center.

We know that you have studied the South African question thoroughly and that we in comparison have had only limited possibilities to study it.

We are of the opinion that you should take on the responsibility in Paris and provide leadership to the comrades on the basis of your experience.

The existing resolution<sup>5</sup> was drafted on the basis of the report of Comrade Wolfson, as amended by Comrade Andrews.<sup>6</sup>

We now learn that Comrade Basner is of the opinion that the report of Comrade Wolfson gives a precise picture of the current situation in South

The reference is to a resolution drafted by the PB of the CPGB on the basis of Wolfson's report (see document 82, vol. II). Wolfson was also part of the commission of the CPGB that had been charged with the task of drafting the resolution. The resolution was drafted for consideration at the forthcoming meeting of A. Marty with I. Wolfson, H. Basner, G. Hardy and P. Kerrigan in Paris in late October.

Most probably, the reference is to W.H. Andrews, who at the time had not yet rejoined the CPSA.

A 1938 report 'On the situation of the Communist Party of South Africa' states that the document approved by the Secretariat of the ECCI in March 1937 was, in fact, 'the decisions' of the ECCI Secretariat on South Africa of March 1936 'with some alterations made' after these decisions were discussed and accepted by the CPSA at its last party conference in September 1936. This, most probably, refers to the resolution on South Africa passed by the Secretariat on 17 March 1936 (see document 63, vol. II).
